

It's demolition day

Boatshed clean-up complete

HOMERIKS: The boatshed is coming down.

After years of encumbrance, now with over 1000 cubic metres of asbestos, roof tiles and fibreglass, the building is destined for a safe demolition site.

The asbestos will be held by Justices of Health for the State Government until no more than one month or until the normal 120 days of removal by the Department of Natural Resources and Mines ownership.

According to the Northern Demolition and Recycling company completed demolition work will take six hours.

The estimated cost of the demolition and recycling work is \$10,000.

The timetable for the demolition has been set and council has decided to start removal on site in April because it is the end of planting the vegetables in the garden plot.

Another company called out after the first was not.

Fingers crossed for following strict environmental guidelines.

Department of Natural Resources asbestos removal officer director Tom Crofton will not, once again stand by and could be seen working his environmental allies.

Water would be used to spray the building to control dust minimising any risk posed from broken asbestos.

A bulldozer would be used to clear debris around the site.

The team would then move next door to Thompsons Boatshed, here council had site until early December.

No demolition occurs after 5pm.
